# The State of Homelessness in London, ON....

In the next several newsletters we're going to be doing a series entitled State of the City: Homelessness in London. Londoners know that the number of people facing homelessness in London is increasing, but we hear lots of questions and confusion about the details

In this article we'll focus on some of the numbers and figures related to homelessness in London. In future sections we will share a more personal look at homelessness in London and what a better path forward may look like.

It's understandable to be confused. It can be difficult to get reliable data. People who don't have homes tend to move often and for many reasons. By-law officers might forcibly displace them, they may need to move to be nearer services, the area where they're staying may flood, or they may find an opportunity to move in with a friend for a few days or weeks.





So, how is information collected? London uses two main methods:

- A ByName List (BNL): The BNL requires that people interact with specific services and consent to have their information recorded. As you might imagine, many people either don't interact with those specific services or don't consent to be tracked.
- A PointinTime (PiT) Count: The PiT Count is a one-day, city-wide count of people in shelters, urban areas, and encampments that takes place every two years. The PiT Count misses anyone camping/sleeping in a place not known to city staff, people staying on a friend's couch for a night, or most of the people who are walking, doing an errand, or taking shelter in a coffee shop, etc.

Both of these measures end up significantly undercounting, and the city doesn't have data available for every year, so we have to try and decipher the trends in spite of the limited information.

In short, the city's information indicates that the number of people who are homeless has quadrupled between 2018 and today.

- In 2018 there were 406 individuals recorded during the Point-in-Time count (data not available from the city for recent years)
- In 2025 there were 1,942 individuals on the By-Name List (data not available from the city for past years)

Keep in mind that these numbers are significant undercounts, and that the true numbers are far higher. However, the numbers show a trend that is mirrored through the experience of charities and organizations in London. The number of people who attend Sanctuary drop-ins has roughly tripled in this same time period.

Unfortunately, as the number of people who are homeless climbs, the number of shelter beds in the city has remained steady or even declined slightly to around 316 spaces. You may have heard about the City's initiative to develop Service Hubs, aren't those helping the situation?

#### Service Hubs

One of London's strategies to address homelessness was its network of service hubs—24/7 centres that offer shelter, health care, case management, meals, hygiene, and links to stable housing.

- The goal was to open 15 hubs, each serving 25–35 people, prioritizing youth, Indigenous peoples, women, and medically complex residents. The funding came from the province (\$10.4 million) and from a portion of the \$25 million donation from an anonymous family.
- Despite these plans, only 2 hubs are open as of mid-2025:
  - 1. Atlohsa Family Healing Services Hub (Indigenous focus)
  - 2. Youth Opportunities Unlimited (Y.O.U.) Hub (youth focus)

#### What This Means for Sanctuary and Our Community

For Sanctuary's community all of these numbers add up to more vulnerability, exposure, and marginalization, and it highlights the need for some new ideas. Sanctuary is working towards the creation of micro homes communities that can offer people safe, affordable, dignified housing. We are looking for suitable land (5+ acres, on transit routes) in order to build a community of care and safety and to help address this crisis.
